

LRAPA negotiated a cooperative agreement that currently allows for the operation of two air toxics monitoring sites in Lane County. Summary data was added to the LRAPA website in 2021 and will be updated yearly when complete yearly data receives final QA approval.	
Implement the Cleaner Air Oregon program.	Green		Ongoing	In November 2019, staff publicized the ranking to prioritize the call-in of existing sources and announced the first 10 facilities to call-in. Five facilities have been called in: JH Baxter (JHB), Seneca Sustainable Energy (SSE), Willamette Valley Company (WVCO), Hexion Inc., and Emerald Forest Products #1 (EFP1), and work is ongoing. Arcimoto was a new source applying for a new permit that went through CAO as part of the initial permit issuance; their permit was issued on 7/1/22. JHB is still in the initial emission inventory phase and has ceased wood treatment activities. SSE's permit renewal, including CAO limits, was issued on 9/20/22. WVCO's Risk Assessment was included in their renewal issued 9/23/22. EFP1's CAO emissions inventory has been received and LRAPA has provided written feedback to the source in September 2022.

This includes keeping inventory levels below previously established quantities. Although the 12-month sales trend has dipped to 7 units/month, new projects are being considered and there has been a notable increase in requests for proposals. Long term goals being considered: licensing existing air samplers to expand the product line and working with designers to create new equipment. A revised business plan will be presented at the November 10, 2022, Board of Directors meeting.

LRAPA is on track to meet our current inspection commitments by September 30, 2022. Permitting backlog of expired permits that are extended administratively is decreasing: 33% overall in the April 2022 dashboard, and 24% now (29% of 14 Title Vs, 24% of 25 Standard ACDPs, and 19% of 27 Simple ACDPs). LRAPA is on track to reduce the administratively extended Title V permits to no more than 20% by the end of 2022 with two more renewals planned for issuance by the end of the calendar year. For permitted source inspections, LRAPA is on track to meet all our EPA inspection commitments.	
Improve compliance inspection, reporting and tracking	Green		Ongoing	Working with LCOG to expand the development of a customized database for LRAPA called "LINFO". The first phase of LINFO has been put into action (i.e., now "live") in May 2020. LINFO now accommodates tracking data and information related to permitted sources. Staff worked with LCOG to successfully add Facility Inspections into LINFO in 2021, and now have a Phase 1 to test for the new Complaints Module. Phase II to include RLID functionality once Phase 1 has been tested and installed.	









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Maintain industrial source LRAPA rules	Green		Ongoing	Cleaner Air Oregon (CAO) rules were adopted by the Board in March 2019 and approved by the EQC in May 2019. DEQ revised the CAO rules in 2021. LRAPA reviewed the changes and is implementing them now. No changes to LRAPA's rules are required. EPA approved LRAPA's delegation request for authority on August 13, 2020, to use DEQ's rules by reference to implement new and revised federal standards (NESHAPs and NSPSs). EPA has not approved LRAPA's May 2021 delegation request. The EQC adopted changes in April 2022 that were intended to correct some definition terms in the rules which would allow EPA to approve the delegation request from LRAPA (and DEQ); EPA approved the LRAPA delegation request on June 22, 2022 LRAPA will need to conduct comprehensive rule changes to adopt the more stringent rules proposed by DEQ that will likely be adopted by the EQC in November 2022. LRAPA will evaluate the final DEQ rules once issued and develop a rulemaking plan to begin in 2023.
